CIL Needs Assessment 2015

Introduction

ILRU and IL-NET are seeking your input to identify training and technical assistance priorities for CILs. The Independent Living program is in a time of transition as a result of changes to the Rehabilitation Act re-authorized by the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act of 2014 (WIOA). WIOA adds a fifth core service (with three parts) for CILs, and re-defines how the Statewide Independent Living Council will involve the CILs in the state in developing and evaluating the implementation of the State Plan for Independent Living.

We need your input on your CIL's needs for technical assistance and training on the WIOA changes, as well as all other topic areas of interest in the next year. The actual language from the Rehabilitation Act as revised by WIOA is provided first, with a question about training and technical assistance after each section. Since regulations have not yet been written, we understand that CIL needs will be defined more specifically as things progress. Your answers to this survey will be extremely helpful, however, in identifying priorities. (The Roman numerals at the start of each section are for numbering purposes only and are not part of the law.)

I. (17) INDEPENDENT LIVING CORE SERVICES.—The term "independent Living core services" means—

- (A) information and referral services:
- (B) independent living skills training;
- (C) peer counseling (including cross-disability peer counseling);
- (D) individual and systems advocacy; and
- (E) services that
 - (i) facilitate the transition of individuals with significant disabilities from nursing homes and other institutions to home and community-based residences, with the requisite supports and services;
 - (ii) provide assistance to individuals with significant disabilities who are at risk of entering institutions so that the individuals may remain in the community; and
 - (iii) facilitate the transition of youth who are individuals with significant disabilities, who are eligible for individualized education programs under section 614(d) of the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (20 U.S.C. 14149d)), and who have completed their secondary education or otherwise left school, to postsecondary life.

II. SEC. 704. STATE PLAN.

- (a)(2) Joint development.—The plan under paragraph (1) shall be jointly—
 - (A) developed by the chairperson of the Statewide Independent Living Council and the directors of the centers for independent living in the State, after receiving public input from individuals with disabilities through the State; and
 - (B) signed by-
 - (i) the chairperson of the Statewide Independent Living Council, acting on behalf of and at the direction of the Council;
 - (ii) the director of the designated State entity [DSE which replaces DSU] described in subsection (c); and
 - (iii) not less than 51 percent of the directors of the centers for independent living in the State.

 - (I) entities carrying out programs that provide independent living services, including those serving older individuals;
 - (II) other community-based organizations that provide or coordinate the provision of housing, transportation, employment, information and referral assistance, services, and supports for individuals with significant disabilities; and
 - (III) entities carrying out other programs providing services for individuals with disabilities.

VI. SEC. 705. STATEWIDE INDEPENDENT LIVING COUNCIL

(a)(2) COMPOSITION.—The Council shall include—

- (b)(A) among its voting members, at least 1 director of a center for independent living chosen by the directors of centers for independent living within the State;
- (B) among its voting members, for a State in which 1 or more centers for independent living are run by, or in conjunction with, the governing bodies of American Indian tribes located on Federal or State reservations, at least 1 representative of the directors of such centers; and
- (C) as ex officio, nonvoting members, a representative of the designated State entity, and representatives from State agencies that provide services for individuals with disabilities;
- (3) ADDITIONAL MEMBERS.—The Council may include—
 - (A) other representatives from centers for independent living;
 - (B) individuals with disabilities;
 - (C) parents and guardians of individuals with disabilities;
 - (D) advocates of and for individuals with disabilities;
 - (E) representatives from private businesses;
 - (F) representatives from organizations that provide services for individuals with

disabilities; and

(G) other appropriate individuals.

- (B) conduct resource development activities to support the activities described in this subsection or to support the provision of independent living services by centers for independent living; and2
- (C) perform such other functions, consistent with the purpose of this chapter and comparable to other functions described in this subsection, as the Council determines to be appropriate.
